We are all aware of the concern for our environment and the threat of climate change – there are stories on the Internet, television and radio daily. Some people, I know are trying to change what they are doing and reducing the effect that they are having on the world – others feel it's all about prophets of doom and the planet will cope and adapt and we can just go on living the way we want and everything will be fine. But can we take the risk...?

Since the 1950/60's humans, mainly in the richer northern hemisphere, have begun to use the world's resources in such a profligate way; without understanding, care or concern for what would be the consequences. Now scientists have observed, mapped, measured and predicted the results of our continual behaviour. Changing and more extreme climate – which we are witnessing, where temperate areas will become wetter and subject to flooding; hotter areas becoming even hotter and the threat of increased tornadoes and forest fires. Of course, planet Earth will survive, but will it be able to support a human population ...? Will our great, grand children be struggling to survive? Can we take the risk? We need to think about our use of materials and resources, where and how our rubbish is disposed and how much we create. If everyone in the world lived as we do in Britain, Europe and North America we would need 2.5 Earths to supply all the resources. People are now more aware of what is happening in the world, the damage that we may inadvertently be doing to the Earth and the consequences for nature as a whole.

I know that many groups, individuals and institutions are doing somethings to alter the effects. The School are recycling many of our previously unrecyclable packaging – more details about what is accepted <https://www.northleighprimaryschool.org.uk/schoolRecycling.php>. They have also achieved their bronze Eco School's Award and are continuing to work towards the next level. St Mary's Church is also working on reducing the impact we have on the planet and how we can improve the local environment for all. This year the Church of England has a huge focus on God's creation. During Lent (which begins on 26th February) there will be a series of Lent Groups looking at the book, 'Saying Yes to Life' by Ruth Valerio. This draws on the days of creation in Genesis 1 using the themes of light, water, land, seasons, other creatures, humankind and sabbath rest. Anyone is welcome to join one of the groups – you don't have to be a member of St Mary's or even be sure you believe in God – you are welcome to join a group. (Get in touch with me for more details).

I was struck by the comment made to Archbishop Justin Welby, 'For you Europeans, climate change is a problem for the future. For us, it is a problem of everyday survival'.

Let us make their survival more likely and less of a struggle as we begin to change small things that together make a huge difference to others.

LAST DAY! The Notice read - Opportunity Gone. Many of you will be familiar with Debenhams in Witney which sadly, due to economic pressure, has succumbed to closure. As far back as last May the press mentioned the likelihood of closure. As January came in the notices rolled up, WARNINGS of what would happen. Finally, in mid-January, it did! Notices saying "Everything Must Go - Store Closing!" The last of these notices pronounced "LAST DAY TODAY" the next day the shutters were down. Any opportunity to take advantage of the long running offers were over, missed, finished!

But let's be honest, a shop closing has little influence on our lives. The Bible on the other hand explains to us many warnings which attract our attention. The greatest being a warning regarding our eternal destiny. Time is short, and we have no life length guarantee. ISAIAH Chapter 55:6 resounds the warning "*Seek ye the Lord while He may be found, call ye upon Him while He is near*". So what does this WARNING mean for us?

SEEK - That's the ACTION to take the opportunity that needs to engage us.

THE LORD – That's the PERSON, we need to engage with, the creator and sustainer of all things (John14:6) He is the most important part of the warning, the answer and the key to life "I AM the Way the Truth and the Life, no man cometh unto the Father but by me". To find Him and to know Him is to understand what He has done for you by dying a sacrificial death in order to pay the price of your sin, His blood was shed, He died to save you.

CALL UPON HIM WHILE HE IS NEAR- That's your PERSONAL responsibility, no one else can do it for you, it is for you to realise the grace God has shown in providing a way for you to be saved from the guilt and judgement for your sin, and to set you right before God. North Leigh Common - the Wildlife Haven on our doorstep

The Common extends to about 41.4 acres (16.8 hectares) and is popular with dogwalkers and others from Neighbouring villages. It is mostly mixed broadleaved woodland with heath features and some open spaces or shadier glades. It was part of a much larger heath and common – the rest was enclosed in centuries past and now farmland.

During the winter months you may see a few birds skulking in the undergrowth or flying overhead, and the occasional deer or rabbit at dawn or dusk. It's a bit like the sleeping princess because come the Spring, it awakens and comes to life with a myriad of plants, flowers, insects, moths and butterflies and of course many more active birds who will sing, nest and breed in and around the common along with other less obvious inhabitants like newts, snakes and mice, moles etc.

If you are interested in the detail, there are extensive records of what has been seen or recorded on this small patch of "wildness".

The ***Friends of North Leigh Common*** is an informal group of local volunteers, originally formed by the late Ian Anderson who with others did much to promote the valuable local asset that the Common represents to all of us. We continue to work once or twice a month aiming to enhance the habitat both for the flora and fauna but also for users to enjoy. We have been joined on occasion by volunteers from the *Cotswolds Wardens* who are very skilled and knowledgeable. In January we had 15 people working most of the morning - enabling a lot to get done. Many thanks to the Warden volunteers - much appreciated! We cut back encroaching brambles and bracken where necessary along the edges of open areas and are trying to enlarge the number of glades by thinning some of the trees and scrub to enable more sunlight to get in to encourage more wild flowers etc and a range of canopy heights which different birds and butterflies like. Nature likes a good bit of untidiness so there will be corners or areas of dense thicket as that is great for nesting birds. It's all about getting a sensible balance to help the wild things thrive for their benefit and everyone's enjoyment. We have four more working parties planned - see the diary at the front of NLN each edition and hope to be planting some trees before the spring arrives- probably a small hazel coppice patch. If anyone fancies coming to help just let me know. All ages are welcome.

We have, with help from *Bird Aid* a sub group of the Wychwood Project, set up a bird feeding station on a corner of land adjoining the common, where we are hoping to encourage the rarer farmland birds to feed there and thus help restore their numbers which have declined drastically over the last fifty years. I will write further on this and other issues in due course and hope to do regular reports on what we have been doing, what has been seen etc- so do report to me anything unusual you spot! **Harry St John, 01993 88152 - hetstjohn@gmail.com**


SHARING ENVIRONMENTAL GARDENING TIPS - NORTH LEIGH GARDENING SOCIETY

In response to Environmental Call to Action in the January issue of NLN below are some of the things you can do to help the environment, however large or small your garden:

1. **Don't tidy up your flowerbeds until Spring arrives**, lots of birds benefit from eating old seed heads, and many insects/animals hibernate in dead plants.
2. **Only lightly trim hedges in the early autumn if you must**, as they are an important food source/and habitat for birds over the winter.
3. **Designate an area to be left wild**. Create habitat. Even nasties like nettles, thistles and brambles are loved by various insects and birds. Nest boxes are a good idea too.
4. **Choose the right native plants that insects like and do well round here**, and need less maintenance/drought tolerant like lavender, rosemary, butterfly bush (buddleias), sea holly, cone flowers (rudbeckias), sunflowers, hollyhocks and asters to name a few. Suggest looking at 'bumblebeeconservation.org' for tips on growing for pollinators..
5. **Conserve water** - collect rainwater in a rain barrel, plants actually prefer real water to tap water. If possible, have a pond, large or small in your garden, the wildlife will love it.
6. **Use natural fertilisers & avoid herbicides** where possible.
7. **Recycle plastic bottles and pots**. Unfortunately there is no solution yet for black plastic plant pots and trays from the WODC, However, **Burford Garden Centre** now has a big bin in its car park to recycle your plant pots, which is a great start.
8. **Create and use your own compost**: Feed your soil its bacteria and invertebrates, this will improve your soils health and promote better plant growth and its water holding capacity. This indirectly conserves water and saves using tap water.
9. **Plant a tree**: trees capture carbon dioxide, removing this harmful greenhouse gas from the atmosphere , so we must plant more to reach **Net Zero emissions by 2050**. Thousands of people are already supporting the **Be a Tree Angel Campaign** run by the Tree Council (Nov 2019), aiming to carpet Britain with a million more trees, helping to clean the air we breathe by filtering harmful pollution which they trap on their leaves and bark. They also prevent flooding, and provide a home for wildlife, like the beautiful barn owls which are getting rarer, with increasingly less habitat to hunt in. If you don't have a garden you can still HELP with this valuable campaign, and simply donate something to help plant trees across Britain via www.beatreeangel.co.uk
